

HOMELAND SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS IPR Enforcement in China

Researchers claim that 80-90% of the world's counterfeit goods originate from the People's Republic of China.

China reports significant success in policing domestic IP violators. Official press releases state IP enforcement efforts yield an average of 26,000 arrests, \$7.4 billion in seized counterfeit each year.

In addition to enforcement and prosecutorial work, China operates a stand-alone IP court system dedicated to ruling on civil and administrative IPR disputes – handling approximately 300,000 cases per year.

To disrupt the export of dangerous counterfeit goods, U.S. law enforcement must continue to foster strong law enforcement collaboration with Chinese counterparts.






HOMELAND SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS IPR Enforcement in China

In its ideal form, IPR Enforcement in China is a collaborative system; a pie with three distinct slices:

- 1. Chinese law enforcement; only domestic investigators and police officers can seize contraband and arrest criminals.
- 2. Private industry brand protection offices exist all over China and frequently develop the initial IPR violation lead; Two Words: Undercover Work.
- 3. HSI and U.S. partner agencies analyze customs, financial, and other proprietary data to map distribution networks, quantify the value of the fraud, and identify international co-conspirators.



HOMELAND SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS IPR Case Study – United States / China

In late 2022, HSI Beijing met with brand protection officers from a U.S. company whose products were allegedly being counterfeited, sold, and exported into the United States by a major technology business in China.



Working with the brand protection office, HSI agents applied analysis of financial and customs data (proprietary DHS information) to develop the private industry lead into *a ready-made case for Chinese police partners*.

HOMELAND SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS IPR Case Study – United States / China

HSI investigative findings identified numerous individuals and companies in the United States that had purchased goods from the target company in China.

Many of these U.S. importers then resold the counterfeit equipment to schools, businesses, and even the U.S. military. The counterfeit technology included telecommunications switches, transceivers, network modules, routers, etc.










HOMELAND SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS IPR Case Study – United States / China

HSI Beijing, private industry brand protection officers, and the Chinese Ministry of Public Security all contributed *significant and unique value* to disrupt the originators of the IPR crime.

As a result, Chinese officers were able to conduct a raid on the violator business, arresting the principal target and a co-conspirator. In a related police action, Chinese officers arrested 27+ individuals and seized 800+ counterfeit devices.

HSI investigative efforts combined with evidence seized during the most recent enforcement action in China allowed HSI Beijing to prompt numerous spin-off investigations in the United States. The first U.S. trial will begin soon and several others are ongoing.

Criminal Copyright Statutory Framework

17 U.S.C. §§ 101-122

Defines what is copyrightable and scope of protections

17 U.S.C. § 506 & 18 U.S.C. §§ 2319, 2319C

- Establishes criminal offenses, based on motive,
 method of infringement, quantity and retail value of works infringed
- Criminal infringement as the exception and not the rule





Omi in a Hellcat Handed 66 Months in Prison For Pirate IPTV, Forfeits \$30m

Bill Omar Carrasquillo, better known online as Omi in a Hellcat, has been sentenced to 66 months in prison for a number of crimes related to his now-defunct pirate IPTV services. In comments outside a Pennsylvania federal court, Carrasquillo said the judge had been "super lenient but fair" and described the sentence - which includes almost \$11m in restitution to several cable companies - as "probably salvation for my fat ass to lose some weight."

After entering a guilty plea some time ago, former pirate IPTV service operator Bill Omar Carrasquillo was sentenced Tuesday in a Philadelphia court.

Last month the U.S. government called for 15.5 years in prison for crimes related to Carrasquillo's pirate

IPTV service, Gears TV, which was shut down by the FBI in 2019.

That was still a far cry from the 500+ years thrown around in the <u>earlier stages</u> of the case, but after causing an estimated \$167 million in damages to TV providers Charter Communications, Comcast, DirecTV, Frontier Corporation, and Verizon Fios, perhaps not



It is unlawful to reproduce or distribute copyrighted material including movies, music, software, or games without authorization.


Individuals who do so risk criminal prosecution under Title 18, United states code, Section 2319. First time offenders convicted of a criminal felony copyright violation face up to five years in prison, fines, restitution, and forfeiture.

















% of change 2021 vs 2022




